Welcome! Today's Epistle reading urges us to "pay much closer attention to what we have heard" (Heb.2:1). How true this is regarding what God has said about His gift of marriage! Do we regard our marriages as the holy partnership described in Genesis 2? Or do we imitate our culture's low view of marriage as a human contract, disposable for any reason? Lord, forgive our negligence to Your commands, and help us to be faithful in all our relationships as You are faithful to us!

TAKE IT FURTHER: Today's Hymn of the Day, LSB 869 With the Lord Begin Your Task

This hymn has its origins in a little Saxon town in Germany named Waldenburg, in the early 1700's. Gottfried Hoffman, a printer, and his son Christian, published travel books filled with helpful information such as "maps, tables of weights and measures, currency calculators, calendar comparisons, tables for interpreting sundials in different locations, and weather information," all sorts of practical information a traveler might need. Most importantly, however, they also contained devotions, prayers, and hymns – admittedly not common in travel guides of today. This hymn first appeared in one of these guides. Interestingly, the town of Waldenburg was very near the village where the father and grandfather of C.F.W. Walther, the Missouri Synod's first president and editor of the synod's first hymnal, served as pastor. This hymn is a part of that hymnal!

TWENTIETH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Old Testament Reading: Genesis 2:18–25

¹⁸Then the LORD God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." 19So out of the ground the LORD God formed every beast of the field and every bird of the heavens and brought them to the man to see what he would call them. And whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. 20The man gave names to all livestock and to the birds of the heavens and to every beast of the field. But for Adam there was not found a helper fit for him. 21So the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and while he slept took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. 22 And the rib that the LORD God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. ²³Then the man said.

"This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man."

²⁴Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh. ²⁵And the man and his wife were both naked and were not ashamed.

Epistle: Hebrews 2:1-13

¹Therefore we must pay much closer attention to what we have heard, lest we drift away from it. ²For since the message declared by angels proved to be reliable and every transgression or disobedience received a just retribution, ³how shall we escape if we neglect such a great salvation? It was declared at first by the Lord, and it was attested to us by those who heard, ⁴while God also bore witness by signs and wonders and various miracles and by gifts of the Holy Spirit distributed according to his will.

⁵Now it was not to angels that God subjected the world to come, of which we are speaking. ⁶It has been testified somewhere,

"What is man, that you are mindful of him, or the son of man, that you care for him?

You made him for a little while lower than the angels;

you have crowned him with glory and honor.

putting everything in subjection under his feet." Now in putting everything in subjection to him, he left nothing outside his control. At present, we do not yet see everything in subjection to him. ⁹But we see him who for a little while was made lower than the angels, namely Jesus, crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

¹⁰For it was fitting that he, for whom and by whom all things exist, in bringing many sons to glory, should make the founder of their salvation perfect through suffering. ¹¹For he who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one origin. That is why he is not ashamed to call them brothers, ¹²saying,

"I will tell of your name to my brothers; in the midst of the congregation I will sing your praise."

¹³And again, "I will put my trust in him." And again, "Behold, I and the children God has given me."

Holy Gospel: Mark 10:2-16

²Pharisees came up and in order to test [Jesus] asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" ³He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" ⁴They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of divorce and to send her away." ⁵And Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote you this commandment. ⁶But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' ⁷Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, ⁸and they shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two but one flesh. ⁹What therefore God has joined together, let not man separate."

¹⁰And in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. ¹¹And he said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her, ¹²and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

¹³And they were bringing children to him that he might touch them, and the disciples rebuked them. ¹⁴But when Jesus saw it, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the children come to me; do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God. ¹⁵Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it." ¹⁶And he took them in his arms and blessed them, laying his hands on them.
